FROM THE ALTAR TO THE WORLD

I recently attended a ZOOM meeting called Reimagining Life Together which helped those in attendance to a better understanding of where we are and what next steps are in returning to a more recognizable church life. Liz and Karl Swenson were also in attendance as was Pastor David King.

There is a document available (Reimagining Life Together) which can be accessed through the conference website – umoi.org - if you are interested in more information than I am giving here. What I have to say today is just a few highlights of what I learned yesterday.

As with our secular community life there are phases that need to be gone through. We are currently in Phase I and will be until at least June 15 – that date will be confirmed or changed upon the bishop’s approval, state guidelines and having a plan which is approved by the District Superintendent. In Phase 2 groups of 10 or fewer can meet in person with appropriate social distancing and wearing of masks. Phase 3 allows for in person worship, weddings and funerals of no more than 50 people. Even in Phase 3 it won’t be normal, no hugging, no singing, no fellowship, no choirs. A phase 4 takes us to a more normal life, but it probably still won’t be “just like it used to be.” There will not be communion unless we are able to get pre-packaged elements and not consume them until we are out in the parking lot in our cars.

There will be increased use of technology. Already the internet program of ZOOM is being used for meetings. There will continue to be such modifications and more. If you are ill at ease with technology, please talk to others including staff about how you can be connected and learn the things you need to learn – it’s not really that difficult. This time might be a chance to involve some of the younger generation in your family network in the church, ask your grandchildren or your sons and daughters to help you if you don’t have a computer or don’t think you have the skills beyond some emailing and googling things of interest.

I can’t believe that I’m writing these words, it seems like science fiction or some alternate universe that we are living, worshiping and loving one another in.

Until I see you, I’m holding you in my heart.
