WORSHIP IN MARCH

In March we continue our journey through the Season of Lent as we follow Jesus on the Way of the Cross. Throughout this season we spend time in reflection considering Jesus, his ministry, the ways that ministry led him to be executed by the authorities of his day. The message of the gospel is a message of liberation, and it is often not understood or not tolerated by the powers of this world.

First we hear from the Apostle Paul about how the wisdom of the world is foolishness to God, while God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom. This is the paradoxical nature of God. That which we can strong is weak in God's eyes, and the strength of God is made perfect only in weakness.

Next we consider a very strange story from the Book of Numbers. After God curses the wandering Hebrew people with a plague of snakes, Moses constructs a bronze snake designed to relieve their suffering. The Gospel of John picks up this image as metaphor for understanding Jesus on the cross.

From the prophet Jeremiah we hear more familiar words. When humans fail to meet the condition of covenant with God, God makes a new covenant. This one isn't written on parchment, but on the human heart.

On the last Sunday in March, we celebrate Palm/ Passion Sunday. Jesus entered Jerusalem on a Sunday to the festive shouts of crowds. By Thursday, he was betrayed by a friend to the Romans. On Friday the crowds had turned against him, and he was executed by crucifixion. We will hear the story of Jesus's last week as told by the Gospel of Mark.

FINANCE UPDATE

The Finance committee met via Zoom on February 10th. The purpose was to finalize and approve our church budget for 2021. Here are some highlights.

We now have a solid budget for this year and we also were able to restart our apportionment giving's to the conference. We had paused them in June of last year due to our concerns of overspending based on the offerings that we were receiving.

As a reminder, please return your pledge cards if you haven't done so already, this gives us a good indication of what we can expect over the course of the year. So far, we have received 18 cards, this amounts to roughly \$63,000 out of a total budget of \$233,000. There are at least 16 of you that normally fill out cards that haven't returned them yet.

I am constantly reminded of how generous each and every one of you are when it comes to supporting our church and for that I would like to say "THANK YOU".

I met Poppa Chuck Walker at Strength for the Journey a few years ago and didn't really know much about him until recently when I have followed his presence on Facebook. Although he himself is not homeless and he is not a "pastor" in any formal sense, he has a ministry of caring and tending to the needs of street people in Portland.

This morning he recounted having a visit from his sister and taking her on his round of visits on the streets of Portland. He had been gifted with a sum of money and used it to buy blankets. He knew who was in need of a warm blanket and together with his sister walked the territory where the homeless gather and camp out and gave those blankets to the neediest.

Most of us would be uncomfortable doing what he does. I remember a few years ago when a few of you went to "Night Strike" under the Burnside Bridge with some of us who were doing it regularly. There we talked to people and sometimes had skills that were helpful to the homeless who came there for food and companionship and help. The center that sponsored this event had a sewing machine and I did some interesting mending that was needed.

I sent a note of thanks to Poppa Chuck for all he does for the homeless and commented to him that his heart is large and full of love and goodness. His response to me was "Truly, it's not me. I just get to be present as 'Love falls down all around us...I call God, Love."

May it be with us as we study and pray and walk our communities that we show evidence that "Love is falling down all around us."

Beloved in Christ,

I write to you today with two announcements that will impact the Greater Northwest Area of The United Methodist Church this year.

On Epiphany, I requested voluntary retirement as a bishop in The United Methodist Church, effective December 31, 2021. Today, I share this news with you.

It seems too early to announce my retirement long before it arrives, but the many steps that proceed the assignment of a new bishop demand it. This is truer this year, with denominational strife, the ongoing pandemic, and the financial consequences of each creating additional uncertainty for our United Methodist connection. While I regret that my retirement may add to the burden of others, I am convinced that this is the right time and the right action for me personally. I will continue to



work diligently with conference leaders through the year to prepare for whatever and whoever comes next. And I trust that God continues to move in the hearts of the faithful to raise up leaders for the next stage of the journey.

The other news I share is less personal but will impact us all the same.

Given the continuing presence of COVID-19 in our communities, we now expect to hold Annual Conference 2021, once again, remotely online.

While a date change is possible, please continue to hold the announced dates, June 9-12, 2021, as we explore alternative possibilities — including multiple virtual sessions. We expect to know more soon as decisions are made about plans for delayed general and jurisdictional conferences. We'll let members of each Annual Conference know more information as it becomes available. Despite the many challenges and transitions life brings, in faith, we know that love lives on. Please know that I continue to hold the people and ministries of the Greater Northwest Area in my prayers as we witness this truth together, though still apart from one another. FORMATION OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

On April 23rd, 1968, The United Methodist Church was created when Bishop Reuben H. Mueller, representing The Evangelical United Brethren Church, and Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke of The Methodist Church joined hands at the constituting General Conference in Dallas, Texas.

With the words, "Lord of the Church, we are united in Thee, in Thy Church and now in The United Methodist Church," the new denomination was given birth by two churches that had distinguished histories and influential ministries in various parts of the world.

Theological traditions steeped in the Protestant Reformation and Wesleyanism and relationships that dated back almost two hundred years facilitated the union.
