FROM THE ALTAR TO THE WORLD

In May we remember and celebrate our mothers. In light of that I'm writing about my mother. My mother, Garnet Lewis Pittman, was many things. She was an artist. She was a loving mother and supportive wife to my father. She was a teacher in her younger years and a farmer's wife in later years as well as being a mother to my brother Ron and me.

If you have been in my home, you have probably noticed the large and stunning charcoal crouching tiger on the wall. I have lived with that tiger as long as I can remember. I have a total of 7 of her pastel and charcoal pictures. Perhaps there are others hidden away in someone's attic.

Her artistry extended to her baking. Some of you may have seen pictures of my pies on Facebook. They are representative of art in the kitchen in the way she finished off the pie and I am able to reproduce the look they had.

As the farmer's wife she loved to milk cows by hand with her cheek against the flank of the animal. Barn time over milking was kind of a sacred time to my mom and dad. That was where they talked over everything that needed to be talked about and they did not encourage my brother and me to learn how to milk cows by hand as they did. In an emergency both of us could however.

My mother died too soon. I had been away to college in Corvallis and then to seminary in Berkeley. I lived in Springfield for a short while and got home as often as possible. Then I went to Costa Rica for two years.

I had just returned from Costa Rica and was living in Hillsboro. In order to marry my Costa Rican guy and get him to the states we had to be married in Costa Rica so I returned there in the Spring of 1968. When we went to the embassy to initiate my husband's visa, I learned that my mother had collapsed and died while out in the field with my dad and brother chasing animals on the loose.

I could write much more but I will stop here. Happy Mother's Day Mom. I love you and remember you every day.
